



GENERAL INFORMATION

Pacific States University is a non-profit, non-sectarian, coeducational institution of higher learning, qualified under the State of California Educational Code to grant degrees. It was founded in 1928 and is engaged in the training of serious men and women for a professional career. The University is approved for the training of veterans under the Veterans Readjustment Benefits Act of 1966. The University is also approved by the United States Department of Immigration and Naturalization for the training of foreign students.

The Pacific States University School of Business Administration offers courses of study leading to the degrees of Bachelor of Business Administration and Master of Business Administration. The Bachelor of Business Administration degree is designed for those students, either domestic or foreign, who are just starting their college careers, and also for those students having an Associate of Arts or Sciences degree from an American university, or the equivalent. The bachelor program provides a thorough foundation in the business concentration selected, but it also provides an excellent foundation in the Liberal Arts subjects such as English, Sociology, History, Natural Science, etc.

Satisfactory completion of the requirements for the Bachelor of Business Administration qualifies the student to enter the Master of Business Administration program in the same concentration as the undergraduate degree. Additional prerequisites would be required if the field of concentration is changed.

The Master of Business Administration program is open to holders of an acceptable Bachelor's degree. It provides the student with the knowledge and material required to pursue a business venture of his own, to perform as a member of management in an industrial organization, or to advance in the accounting profession.

DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

The Bachelor of Business Administration degree requires the completion of a minimum of 126 units of academic work as determined by the prescribed College of Business Administration curriculum. The candidate's grade point average m 2.0 ('C') or better, with no grade below 'C' in the major field.

The Master of Business Administration in Industrial Management is conferred upon satisfactory completion of 45 units of academic work, including a project with a value of 3 units. Completion of the Bachelor of Business Administration degree in Management at this university carries with it credit for 15 units toward the degree of M.B.A. in Industrial Management at Pacific States University. The grade point average must be 3.0 ("B") or better with only one (1) grade below "B" (a "C") allowed in the program.

The Master of Business Administration in Accounting is conferred upon satisfactory completion of 30 units of academic work beyond the 126 units required for the Bachelor of Business Administration in Accounting as prescribed by this catalog. The grade point average for the degree must be 3.0 ("B") or better with only one (1) grade below "B" (a "C") allowed in the program.

DAY AND EVENING CLASSES

The B.B.A. curriculum is offered in both day and evening sessions. This makes it possible for the student to transfer from one session to the other without loss of credit. Class sessions are divided into three sixteen week semesters per year (trimester system). The minimum time necessary to complete the Bachelor of Business Administration requirements is seven semesters - 28 months.

The M.B.A. curriculum is offered primarily on Saturday. The minimum time necessary to complete the Master of Business Administration requirements is three semesters - 12 months.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Admission of undergraduates is granted on the basis of high school graduation or its equivalent. Acceptable scores on the General Educational Development tests are also considered satisfactory. Where an applicant fails to meet the admission requirements he may arrange to enter as a Special Student after a personal interview. Special Students are considered to be on probation until Heir academic performance warrants a change to regular standing. The maximum period of time that a student can be classified as a Special Student is two semesters (eight months).

Students from other acceptable institutions may transfer into Pacific States University with advanced standing. Transfer credit will be granted for equivalent courses in which a grade of "C" or higher was obtained.

Admission of graduate students is determined by the Graduate Committee. Admission to the Master of Business Administration program in Industrial Management will be granted to holders of an acceptable bachelor's degree. Candidates holding degrees in fields other than business will be required to take a minimal number of basic business subjects to prepare for the advanced courses in the graduate program.

Admission to the Master of Business Administration program in Accounting will be granted to holders of an acceptable bachelor's degree in Accounting. Candidates holding degrees in fields other than Accounting will be required to prepare for the graduate program.

Candidates for the Master of Business Administration degrees will be required to take the Admission Test for Graduate Study in Business (ATGSB) within two (2) semesters after their initial enrollment. The score is not used as a condition of acceptance, nor does it affect continuation in either graduate program. A scholarship is awarded each term to the student receiving the highest grade on the ATGSB that semester.

APPLICATION FOR ADMISSION

PROCEDURES

- Submit application form. All blanks must be filled in, except for the "office block: at the upper right. All data must be typed or printed in ink.
- Application fee (\$20.00) must accompany the Application form. This is a one-time payment and is non-refundable.
- 3. <u>Transcripts</u>. Upon application for admission, the applicant has the responsibility for arranging that transcripts from other institutions which he attended be sent by those institutions to Pacific States University. Admission cannot be effected until all transcripts are received and evaluated. Transcripts from foreign institutions must be translated into Enalish.
- Foreign applicants must submit certification of English Comprehension in the country of origin or the TOEFL score.

Applications should be received at least thirty days prior to the starting date of the semester. $\hspace{1cm}$

VETERANS

Pacific States University is approved for the training of veterans under the Veterans Readjustment Benefits Act of 1966. Students who are veterans are encouraged to personally file the application from the Veterans Administration and secure a Certificate of Eligibility (VA Form 211E-1993). It is important to present this form to the University Veterans Counselor as soon as it is received. The Veterans Counselor at Pacific States University will be most happy to assist in any way possible.

INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

International students are welcomed at the University; and every effort is made to assist these students. Currently, there are students from twenty-six nations attending Pacific States University. In addition to the requirements stated in the General Information section, the following specifically apply to foreign students:

- F-1 Students (students who attend Pacific States University on a student visa) are required to be FULL-TIME STUDENTS as follows:
 - Undergraduates must carry a minimum of 12 units each of the three trimesters.
 - Graduate program students must carry a minimum of 9 units each of the three trimesters.
- At the time official documents are to be signed, passport and visa renewed or approved, the student must be a full-time student in good standing academically and financially.
- Students requiring F-2 status for a husband or wife must complete two consecutive trimesters of 12 units each for undergraduates and 9 units each for graduates.
- PACIFIC STATES UNIVERSITY is listed on Page 41 of the U.S.A. Official Education Directory, 1973. This is referred to as the H.E.W. Directory.
- F-I students can work or hold jobs only with the permission given by the Department of Immigration, 300 North Los Angeles Street, Los Angeles, California 90012.
- Students deliberately collaborating (cheating) on examinations will
 receive a grade of "F" and are eligible for expulsion from the University.
 The word of the professor regarding this matter will be considered
 adequate proof.
- 7. New students will pay a deposit of \$200.00 or more to enroll. Bangladesh and Nigerian students are required by their proper governments to deposit two (2) semesters tuition (\$800.00) before visa approval. Upon receipt of deposit, a certified letter will be mailed to the Embassy of their country. Continuing students may pay tuition in three installments with the permission of the registering office.
- The United States Immigration Department expects an F-1 incoming student to remain in attendance for a minimum of two semesters at the University issuing the 1-20 for entry into the U.S. before transferring to another school.
- All tuition must be paid in full before the beginning of the succeeding trimester.
- 10. Students are required to pay for books at the time of purchase.
- 11. A copy of the student's Sponsorship letter must be submitted to the University.
- 12. Any policy deviations must be submitted to the office personally, in writing, and approved by a school official.

LIVING ACCOMMODATIONS

Pacific States University is centrally located and easily accessible to public transportation. A wide choice of living accommodations is possible depending upon the need and financial resources of the individual. In the vicinity of the school there are a number of apartments and rooms, some with board available. The office endeavors to assist prospective students to find suitable quarters.

APPROXIMATE COST OF PROGRAMS

Based on the fee schedules listed in the catalog, the total costs for the Bachelor of Business Administration program will be approximately \$4,000, not including living expenses.

The cost of programs leading to the Master's degree will be approximately \$2,200 for Industrial Management and \$1,500 for Accounting, not including living expenses in either case. The combined B.B.A./M.B.A. program is estimated at \$5,500, not including living expenses.

OBLIGATION FOR PAYMENT

Failure to make payments of tuition, fees or other owed amounts when they fall due, or to arrange for such payments to the University before their delinquent dates, is considered sufficient cause to (1) bar the student from classes or examination, (2) withhold diploma, scholastic certificate, or transcript of record, and/or (3) suspend the student.

REFUND OF TUITION

Total unit costs affected by study program changes will be adjusted on the basis of one-sixth (1/6) of total tuition charged for each week of attendance. If paid-in tuition exceeds the adjusted costs, a refund will be allowed. After the sixth week, however, no refunds will be allowed and the student is responsible for the full tuition balance.

REFUND POLICY FOR VETERANS

This institution provides for the pro-rata refund of the unused portion of tuition, fees and other charges in the event the veteran fails to enter the course, or withdraws, or is discontinued therefrom at any time prior to completion.

TUITION AND FEES

Admission fee, student body fee, and all other fees are payable in advance are not refundable.

Transcript fees and other charges relating to academic activities are payable when due and are not refundable.

Tuition is payable in full before classes begin. If deferred payment is required or requested, the business office will, by personal conference, arrange a payment schedule to meet the need (See Statement of Financial Responsibility). A fee of 5% will be added for a deferred payment plan.





GENERAL INFORMATION

Pacific States University is a non-profit, non-sectarian, co-educational Institution of higher learning, qualified under the State of California Educational Code to grant degrees. It was founded in 1928 and is engaged in the training of serious men and women for a professional career. The University is approved for the training of veterans under the Veterans Readjustment Benefits Act of 1966. The University is also approved by the United States Department of Immigration and Naturalization for the training of foreign students.

The University offers both undergraduate and graduate programs in Electronic Engineering.

The Bachelor of Science in Electronic Engineering (B.S.E.E.) provides a thorough foundation in mathematics and physics, which is reinforced with appropriate studies in chemistry, thermodynamics, mechanics and other basic engineering disciplines. The student is qualified in the entire field of electronics, and is able to specialize in one or more of its branches. The basic fundamentals are stressed because they remain valid and are, in fact, the foundation on which technical advances are made.

The Master of Science in Electronic Engineering (M.S.E.E.) program is a carry-on degree program designed to develop the in-depth capability of the graduate student within the practical aspects of the engineering sciences. Particular emphasis in this program has been placed upon the development of pragmatic skills in the fields of analog and digital circuit and system of power conversion techniques. The statistical and managerial skills needed by the advanced engineer are offered to round out the degree program and provide the graduate with a job-ready background in this sphere of engineering.

DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

The Bachelor of Science in Electronic Engineering (B.S.E.E.) is conferred after the completion of a minimum of 136 units of academic work as determined by the prescribed College of Engineering curriculum. A minimum of 29 units in the Humanities must be included within the 136 units. The candidate's grade point average must be a 2.0 ("C") or better, with no grade below "C" in the major field.

The Master of Science in Electronic Engineering (M.S.E.E.) is conferred upon satisfactory completion of a minimum of 31 units of academic work beyond the 136 units required for the Bachelor of Science in Electronic Engineering degree as prescribed by this catalog. The grade point average for the degree must be 3.0 ('B') or above with no grade below 'B' in the major field.

DAY AND EVENING CLASSES

The same curriculum is offered in both day and evening sessions. This makes it possible for the student to transfer from one session to the other without loss of credit. Class sessions are divided into three sixteen week semesters per year (trimester system). The minimum time necessary to complete the Bachelor of Science in Electronic Engineering requirements is eight semesters 32 months. The minimum time necessary to complete the Master of Science in Electronic Engineering is two semesters - 8 months.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Admission of undergraduates is granted on the basis of high school graduation or its equivalent. Acceptable scores on the General Educational Development tests are also considered satisfactory. Where an applicant fails to meet the admission requirements, he may arrange to enter as a Special Student after a personal interview. Special Students are considered to be on probation until their academic performance warrants a change to regular standing. The maximum period of time that a student can be classified as a Special Student is two semesters (eight months).

Admission of graduate students is determined by the Graduate Committee. A student may become a candidate for the Master of Science in Electronic Engineering program in one of two ways.

1. The completion of a B.S.E.E. or equivalent program with a high academic achievement level. The student should have completed all prerequisites for the M.S.E.E. courses demonstrating capability to perform graduate level work. The Chairman of Engineering may require the candidate to take certain courses before becoming a candidate for the M.S.E.E. program if his background is deemed lacking in specific technical spheres. This evaluation will be made upon application of the candidate for the degree program.

2. In some cases a candidate for the B.S.E.E. degree at Pacific States University may petition for candidacy to the M.S.E.E. program without having received the B.S.E.E. degree. The candidate must have completed the first seven (7) trimesters at a high academic achievement level and must demonstrate capability to perform graduate level work. The Chairman of Engineering may require the candidate to make up any course material necessary for a candidate for the M.S.E.E. degree.

Students from other acceptable institutions may transfer into Pacific States University with advanced standing. Transfer credit will be granted for equivalent courses in which a grade of "C" or higher was obtained.

APPLICATION FOR ADMISSION

PROCEDURES

- Submit application form. All blanks must be filled in, except for the "office block" at the upper right. All data must be typed or printed in ink.
- Application fee (\$20.00) must accompany the application form. This is a one-time payment and is non-refundable.
- 3. Transcripts. Upon application for admission, the applicant has the responsibility for arranging that transcripts from other institutions which he attended be sent by those institutions to Pacific States University. Admission cannot be effected until all transcripts are received and evaluated. Transcripts from foreign institutions must be translated into English.
- 4. Foreign applicants must submit certification of English Comprehension in the country of origin or the TOEFL score.

Applications should be received at least thirty days prior to the starting date of the semester.

VETERANS

Pacific States University is approved for the training of veterans under the Veterans Readjustment Benefits Act of 1966. Students who are veterans are encouraged to personally file the application from the Veterans Administration and secure a Certificate of Eligibility (VA Form 211E-1993). It is important to present this form to the University Veterans Counselor as soon as it is received. The Veterans Counselor at Pacific States University will be most happy to assist in any way possible.

INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

International students are welcomed at the University; and every effort is made to assist these students. Currently there are students from twenty-six nations attending Pacific States University. In addition to the requirements stated in the General Information section, the following specifically apply to foreign students:

 F-l students (students who attend Pacific States University on a student visa) are required to be FULL-TIME STUDENTS as follows:

Undergraduates must carry a minimum of 12 units each of the three trimesters.

Graduate program students must carry a minimum of 9 units each of the three trimesters.

- At the time official documents are to be signed, passport and visa renewed or approved, the student must be a full-time student in good standing academically and financially.
- Students requiring F-2 status for a husband or wife must complete two consecutive trimesters of 12 units each for undergraduates and 9 units each for graduates.
- 4. PACIFIC STATES UNIVERSITY is listed on Page 41 of the U.S.A. Official Education Directory, 1973. This is referred to as the H.E.W. Directory.
- F-1 students can work or hold jobs only with the permission given by the Department of Immigration, 300 North Los Angeles Street, Los Angeles, California 90012.
- Students deliberately collaborating (cheating) on examinations will receive a grade of "F" and are eligible for expulsion from the University. The word of the professor regarding this matter will be considered adequate proof.
- 7. New students will pay a deposit of \$200.00 or more to enroll. Bangladesh and Nigerian students are required by their proper governments to deposit to (2) semesters tuition (\$800.00) before visa approval. Upon receipt deposit, a certified letter will be mailed to the Embassy of their country. Continuing students may pay tuition in three installments with the permission of the registering office.
- The United States Immigration Department expects an F-1 incoming student to remain in attendance for a minimum of two semesters at the University issuing the I-20 for entry into the U.S. before transferring to another school.
- All tuition must be paid in full before the beginning of the succeeding trimester.
- 10. Students are required to pay for books at the time of purchase.
- 11. A copy of the student's Sponsorship letter must be submitted to the University.
- 12. Any policy deviations must be submitted to the office personally, in writing, and approved by a school official.

LIVING ACCOMMODATIONS

Pacific States University is centrally located and easily accessible to public transportation. A wide choice of living accommodations is possible depending upon the need and financial resources of the individual. In the vicinity of the school there are a number of apartments and rooms, some with board available. The office endeavors to assist prospective students to find suitable quarters.

APPROXIMATE COST OF PROGRAMS

Based on the fee schedules listed in this catalog, the total costs for the Bachelor of Science in Electronic Engineering program will be approximately \$4,400, not including living expenses.

The cost of programs leading to the Master's degree will be approximately \$2,300, not including living expenses.

OBLIGATION FOR PAYMENT

Failure to make payments of tuition, fees or other owed amounts when they fall due, or to arrange for such payments to the University before their delinquent dates, is considered sufficient cause to (1) bar the student from classes or examination, (2) withhold diploma, scholastic certificate, or transcript of record, and/or (3) suspend the student.

REFUND OF TUITION

Total unit costs affected by study program changes will be adjusted on the basis of one-sixth (1/6) of total tuition charged for each week of attendance. If paid-in tuition exceeds the adjusted costs, a refund will be allowed. After the sixth week, however, no refunds will be allowed and the student is responsible for the full tuition balance.

REFUND POLICY FOR VETERANS

This institution provides for the pro-rata refund of the unused portion of tuition, fees and other charges in the event the veteran fails to enter the course, or withdraws, or is discontinued therefrom at any time prior to completion.

TUITION AND FEES

Admission fee, student body fee, and all other fees are payable in advance and

Transcript fees and other charges relating to academic activities are payable when due and are not refundable.

Tuition is payable in full before classes begin. If deferred payment is required or requested, the business office will, by personal conference, arrange a payment schedule to meet the need (See Statement of Financial Rsponsibility). A fee of 5% will be added for a deferred payment plan.
