YOUTH WORK

675. YOUTH WORK IN ENGLAND. Compiled by P.H.K. Kuenstler. University of Bristol Institute of Education Publication No. 6. 1954. University of London Press. 4s. 127 pages. (Paper bound). (369.402)

These extracts from Ministry of Education and unofficial documents relating to Youth Service and Youth Welfare Work in England were compiled by Mr. Kuenstler at the request, in 1952, of the German Youth Archive Incorporated at Munich. Part I covers the Youth Service of the Ministry of Education and of the Chief Voluntary Youth Organisations (including a section devoted to King George's Jubilee Trust); Part II deals with Youth Welfare (e.g. the Youth Employment Service, the Employment of Children, the Protection of Youth in Factories and of Children generally, and Juvenile Delinquency). Explanatory notes briefly indicate the origin of some of the documents or, where necessary, connect the extracts. The book is a useful compilation of information for the student and organiser of Youth Work, and is recommended for overseas distribution.

EDUCATIONAL THEORY

676. THE DOCTRINES OF THE GREAT EDUCATORS. Robert R. Rusk. Second edition, revised and enlarged. 1954. Macmillan. 10s. 6d. 311 pages. (370.1)

This book, which first appeared in 1918, restricts itself to an exposition of the doctrines of thirteen of the great educators, amongst whom are three Englishmen - Sir Thomas Elyot, Milton and John Locke. For this revised edition some chapters have been entirely rewritten, the references in the text have been brought up to date, and a chapter on John Dewey has been added. There is a useful index of names, titles and subjects.

EDUCATIONAL PSYCHOLOGY

677. INTRODUCTION TO EDUCATIONAL PSYCHOLOGY. W.M. Ryburn. 1949, reprinted 1953. Teaching in India Series XVI. Oxford University Press. 7s. 6d. 308 pages. (370.15)

First published in 1949, this book has now been reprinted in its original form. By the author of THE PRINCIPLES OF TEACHING and PLAY WAY SUGGESTIONS, the book, although it is intended primarily for Indian educationists, gives such a sensible introduction to the subject and is so clearly written that it should be useful in all countries requiring material on this subject.

This Index includes Circulars, Administrative Memoranda, Manuals of Guidance and School Meals Service Memoranda issued by the Ministry of Education between 15th August 1944 and 31st March 1954, and still current on the latter date. It also includes Circulars issued by the Welsh Department of the Ministry of Education.

679. LONDON EDUCATION STATISTICS 1952-53. The Education Officer, London County Council, The County Hall, London, S.E. 1. 1954. Staples Press. 9d. 24 pages. (Paper bound). (370.58)

This pamphlet showing the scope of London's educational facilities includes statistics on primary and secondary education, the special services, recreation, further education, scholarships and exhibitions, training of teachers, youth employment, and school equipment.

UNESCO

680. REPORT BY THE DIRECTOR GENERAL AND THE EXECUTIVE BOARD ON THE ACTIVITIES OF THE ORGANIZATION DURING THE YEAR 1953. UNESCO. Obtainable from H.M. Stationery Office. 21s. 216 pages. (370.621)

This report for the year 1953 includes a section on education dealing with such branches of the subject as the documentation, studies and diffusion of educational information, fundamental, primary and adult education, education of women, education for living in a world community, curricula, methods, textbooks, and work with youth.

TEACHERS COLLEGES

681. HANDBOOK ON TRAINING FOR TEACHING. 1954. Published for the Association of Teachers in Colleges and Departments of Education by Methuen. 21s. 408 pages. (370.72)

This Handbook provides information about training for teaching in Two-year Colleges, Froebel, Domestic, Physical Education, Art and Technical Colleges, and University Education Departments. Each section is introduced by an exposition of the particular approach to teaching, and of the concept underlying the training offered. Details are given of the courses provided, and of the situation, facilities and conditions of the various colleges. The Handbook is an essential reference book for anyone seeking information about training for teaching, and the provision made for it in England and Wales.

EDUCATION, GREAT BRITAIN

682. EDUCATION IN SCOTLAND IN 1953. A Report of the Secretary of State for Scotland. Cmd. 9141. Scotlish Education Department. 1954. H.M. Stationery Office. 3s. 6d. 109 pages. (370.941)

This annual report covers the developments in Scotland during 1953 in primary, secondary and further education, school buildings, physical welfare, training and supply of teachers, finance, administration, approved schools, international contacts and the Royal Scottish Museum. Statistical tables are appended. The introduction includes an account of "Bursary Provision From Public Funds" from the nineteenth century onwards.

683. CIVIL ESTIMATES for the year ending 31st March, 1955. Class IV. Education and Broadcasting. H.C.P. 99-IV. 1954. H.M. Stationery Office. 4s. 6d. 105 pages. (370.942)

Class IV of the Civil Estimates covers estimates for the Ministry of Education and the Scottish Education Department, national museums, libraries and art galleries, various institutions and bodies concerned with science, learning and the arts, universities and colleges, and the British Broadcasting Corporation. The appendix gives the scales of pay, etc., of staff.

EDUCATION. GREAT BRITAIN (Contd.)

684. THE DE LA SALLE BROTHERS IN GREAT BRITAIN. The Story of a Century of Effort and Achievement in the Domain of English Education. W.J. Battersby. 1954. Burns and Oates. 5s. 102 pages. (Paper bound). (370.942)

This account of the efforts and achievement in English education by the de la Salle Brothers of the Christian Schools is divided into three periods: from 1854 - 1870, beginning with the first exploratory visit of two French Brothers to England; from 1870 - 1900 during which time much was accomplished under the able guidance of Brother Potomian (whose biography by Dr. Battersby was published in 1953 - see Note 422, List 21) and, finally, from 1900 to the present day. The story shows the difficulties of the Voluntary and denominational schools in their efforts to obtain financial help from public funds, and depicts the struggle for Catholic education in Great Britain during the last hundred years. The appendix contains a list of the schools of the De La Salle Brothers now established in Great Britain. These include grammar, secondary modern and preparatory schools, a training college and approved schools.

685. EDUCATION IN 1953. Being the Report of the Ministry of Education and the Statistics of Public Education for England and Wales. Cmd. 9155.
Ministry of Education. 1954. H.M. Stationery Office. 6s. 189 pages. (370.942)

Part I of this official report describes the work achieved during 1953 in England and Wales in primary, secondary and further education, special educational services, teachers' training etc., university awards, information and international relations, and museums. Part II is composed of statistics for these branches of public education.

686. A GALAXY OF GOVERNESSES. Bea Howe. 1954. Verschoyle. 15s. 206 pages. (370.942)

This delightful account of the English governess, in fact and in fiction, traces her origin as far back as the reign of King Alfred, and follows her progress through the centuries up to the Victorian era when "England held the monoply for the supply of the best nannies and governesses to the world in general". The chapter entitled "The English Governess Abroad" is, indeed, particularly fascinating, and describes the experiences of a group of unusual and interesting characters, among whom were Maria Graham (imperial governess in Brazil), Anna Leonowens (governess to the children of the King of Siam), and Emmeline Lott (governess to the Infant Pasha, son of the Viceroy of Egypt).

TEACHER TRAINING

687. ON BECOMING A TEACHER. T.E.A. Verity. 1954. University of London Press. 6s. 120 pages. (371.1)

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Based on papers submitted by a group of Christian teachers connected with the British Council of Churches, the aim of this book is to set out the duty of a man or a woman who is both a Christian and a teacher. The practical problems of relationship with colleagues, pupils, parents, landladies, and of life outside school hours are discussed, as well as religious instruction and belief, and professional ideals. The book should be useful to students and young teachers in Protestant countries where conditions for teachers are somewhat similar to those in Great Britain.

SUPPLY OF TEACHERS

688. THE SHORTAGE OF SCIENCE TEACHERS. Report of a Committee on the Shortage of Science Teachers. 1954. Federation of British Industries, 21, Tothill Street, London, S.W. 1. 1s. 6d. 23 pages. (Paper bound). (371.14)

This report of an independent Committee, set up by the Federation of British Industries under the Chairmanship of Dr. Percy Dunsheath, to study the shortage of scientific and mathematics teachers considers the supply of and demand for these graduates, and suggests remedies for the general shortage of scientists and of graduate science teachers. An expansion of university science departments, an increase in the salary scales for science teachers, and greater publicity for science teaching as a career are among the recommendations made by the Committee.

TEACHERS' SALARIES, PENSIONS, ETC.

689. THE STAFFING OF GRAMMAR SCHOOLS. A Survey of the Staffing of Sixty-Six Grammar Schools in the North West of England with Special Reference to the Teaching of Arts, Science and Mathematics. W.E. Egner and A. Young. 1954. University Press, Liverpool. 2s. 20 pages. (Paper Bound). (371.147)

This enquiry into the qualifications, length of service, age distribution and extra remuneration of the teaching staff in boys' and mixed Grammar Schools in the counties of Lancashire and Cheshire covers also the size of the schools, the strength of the sixth forms and the academic qualifications and ages of the headmasters. The aim of the survey is to throw light upon the shortage of teachers in certain subjects in the Grammar School curriculum, to study the deployment of specialist and other teachers, and to examine the way in which Special Responsibility Allowances have been awarded to teachers with special duties and qualifications.

690. THE TEACHERS' SALARIES (SCOTLAND) REGULATIONS, 1954. Circular No. 285. Scottish Education Department. 1954. H.M. Stationery Office, 6d. 17 pages. (371.16)

This circular draws attention to the principal differences between the Regulations of 1954 and those of 1951 (other than differences in the amounts of the salaries payable under the Regulations), and gives guidance on various provisions in the new Regulations. The salaries of teachers in primary, secondary and further education are dealt with, and the increases of basic scales of teachers in special cases, including those in remote schools and in schools on distant islands are indicated.

EXAMINATIONS, MENTAL TESTS

691. MEASURABLE ENGLISH TESTS. A Comprehensive Series of Tests for Upper Juniors and Lower Seniors. Haydn Richards. 1954. Cassell. 4s. 6d. 98 pages. (371.26)

There is a considerable demand for tests in English similar to those devised for intelligence testing, and this book contains a varied selection for pupils aged ten to fourteen. Some of these might be adapted as language games for foreign students.

TEACHING METHODS

692. PRINCIPLES OF CLASS TEACHING. Frank Smith and A.S. Harrison. 1st edition 1937, reprinted 1954. Macmillan. 7s. 6d. 384 pages. (371.3)

This standard book, by the Professor of Education in the University of Leeds and a member of the staff of the University of London Institute of Education, has now been reprinted for the fourth time in its original form. Part One discusses the curriculum, the type of school and the mental and physical development of the pupils. Part Two reviews the curriculum as it is adapted to the various types of schools (e.g. nursery, primary and secondary), and Part III considers various principles underlying methods of teaching.

VOCATIONAL

693. EDUCATION AND TRAINING IN THE FIELD OF MANAGEMENT. Volume II. 1954. British Institute of Management, Management House, 8 Hill Street, London, W. 1. 3s. 6d. 82 pages. (Paper bound). (371.426)

This survey of short courses available in the United Kingdom in education and management includes details of courses for supervisors, for young workers, apprentices and entrants to industry, for trade unionists and for education, training and personnel officers, and gives particulars of courses in joint consultations, in communications, and summer schools. It is a useful reference book on the subject.

SCHOOL BUILDINGS, EQUIPMENT, ETC.

694. SCHOOL BUILDING IN SCOTLAND. I. Planning Primary Schools. 1954. Scottish Education Department. H.M. Stationery Office. ls. 6d. 40 pages. (371.62)

This, the first of a series of handbooks about school building to be issued by the Scottish Education Department, deals with the design of primary schools in Scotland. Plans of classroom blocks, infant classrooms, halls and other offices are given, and details of sanitary and cloakroom requirements are included in the appendix.

695. INVENTORIES OF APPARATUS AND MATERIALS FOR TEACHING SCIENCE. Volume III Technical Colleges. Part 4 Electrical Engineering. 1954. UNESCO. Obtainable from H.M. Stationery Office. 15s. 6d. 147 pages. (371.66)

Part 4 of Volume III Technical Colleges deals with the training of electrical engineers. It contains three subdivisions in which is to be found information about the organization and the equipment for the teaching of electricity at the Ecole Supérieure d'Electricité (France), the Royal Technical College, (Sweden), and in Great Britain.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

696. DRAFT SYLLABUS OF PHYSICAL EDUCATION FOR PRIMARY SCHOOLS. Part I. Physical Training. Classes: Primary I - VII. Scottish Education Department. 1954. H.M. Stationery Office. 9d. each. 23 pages each. (371.7322)

In view of the modern developments in the field of physical education, a committee representative of the Scottish Education Department's Inspectors, Training College Lecturers and Education Authority Organisers has prepared this draft syllabus of physical education which is to be used for a period throughout Scotland on an experimental basis. Each pamphlet consists of introductory notes giving advice on the application of the syllabus, content of the lesson, method, dress, discipline, apparatus, and outdoor work, and eight lessons for each year of the primary school course (each lesson containing sufficient material for approximately five weeks). Suggestions for an up-to-date syllabus in games and dancing are to follow in due course.

697. PHYSICAL EDUCATION FOR CHILDREN. A Handbook of Objective Activities. D. Cyril Joynson. 1954. Nicholas Kaye. Full Cloth Library Edition 15s. Limp Covers 7s. 6d. 218 pages. (371.7322)

This book is a useful supplement to the Ministry of Education's recent publication "PLANNING THE PROGRAMME", as it contains a number of activities which interpret the general principles advocated by the Ministry, suggests variations in the framework of the programme, and provides an expanded programme and scheme of work for Infant and Junior children (ages five to eleven). Chapters deal with the structure and content of the daily lesson, suggest various forms of activities and exercises (including expressive and creative movements and the modern dance), and describes equipment and apparatus. The book is well illustrated with line drawings.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION (Contd.)

698. MOBILE CAMPING. A Supplement to Ministry of Education Pamphlet No. 11 (Organised Camping). 1954. H.M. Stationery Office. 6d. 15 pages. (371.76)

This Supplement applies the basic principles of good camping (already set out in the Ministry of Education's pamphlet for those responsible for introducing school children and young people in organised parties to camp life) to mobile and "light-weight" camping on the part of individuals or small groups. (When ORGANISED CAMPING is next reprinted, this supplement will be incorporated in it, and will then cease to be published separately).

NURSERY SCHOOLS

699. MARGARET MCMILLAN: Prophet and Pioneer. Emma Stevinson. 1954. Published for the Margaret McMillan Fellowship by the University of London Press. 1s. 6d. 15 pages. (Paper bound). (372.2412)

Miss Stevinson, former Principal of the Rachel McMillan Training College, gives an illuminating account of the development of Margaret McMillan's work with young children, which led to the founding of the Training Centre and Open Air Nursery School dedicated to her sister, Rachel.

PRIMARY EDUCATION

700. A GUIDE TO THE LEARNING AND TEACHING OF READING. With Notes on the Use of THE JOY FAMILY Reading Books and Apparatus. T. Payten Gunton. 1954. Grant Educational Company. 6s. 79 pages. (372.4)

By a former H.M. Inspector of Schools, this book gives a brief outline of the reading process, offers general guidance on diagnosis and on the discovery of causes of backwardness, and indicates how the four JOY FAMILY books which, in addition to being reading books, present a method of teaching reading to non-readers or backward readers aged seven to eleven, can be used to the best advantage. A chapter is devoted to the use of the apparatus provided to accompany the JOY FAMILY books. The latter are published at 2s. 6d. each.

701. INFANT HANDWORK. Isobel S. Arneil. 1954. Teaching Aids Series 2. Nelson. 3s. 6d. 48 pages. (Paper bound). (372.5)

This practical little book consists of a series of handwork lessons, one for each week during the child's first year at school. Clearly and boldly set out, the lessons cover all kinds of work with paper, cardboard, plasticine, matchboxes and other materials (many of them odd bits and pieces), and should provide teachers of young children with many useful and original ideas.

702. NUMBER. An Account of Work in Number with Children throughout the Primary School Stage. Thyra Smith. 1954. Basil Blackwell. 9s. 6d. 159 pages. (372.7)

The author, who was formerly one of H.M. Inspectors of Schools, discusses the stages of growth of a child's conception of number from the early years to the age of eight, and urges that the approach to abstract number should not be hurried. Chapters on the infant and junior school give much helpful advice to teachers. Written clearly and simply, the book, which is full of careful observations and thoughtful suggestions, should be of interest to parents as well as to teachers of young children.

ADULT EDUCATION

703. CURRENT PROBLEMS AND PRACTICES IN WORKERS' EDUCATION. B. Ghosh. 1954. International Labour Office, 38-39, Parliament Street, London, S.W. 1. 9d. 35 pages. (Paper bound). (374.02)

This article, reprinted from the International Labour Review Vol. LXVIII, No. 1, July 1953, describes what is being done to provide educational facilities for workers in various countries at the present time. The author divides workers' education into three groups (primary education, education of the worker as a member (a) of a profession and (b) of the community), indicates the scope and content of the programmes devised for each group, and discusses the various methods and techniques employed. In conclusion, an account is given of the agencies providing these facilities, including workers' associations, universities, governments and specialised agencies.

704. THE ORGANISATION AND FINANCE OF ADULT EDUCATION IN ENGLAND AND WALES.
Report of the Committee appointed by the Minister of Education in June 1953.
Ministry of Education. 1954. H.M. Stationery Office. 2s. 6d. 67 pages.
(374.0942)

This Committee (under the Chairmanship of Dr. Eric Ashby) was appointed by the Minister of Education in 1953 after a widespread public protest against a proposed ten per cent reduction in the adult education estimates for 1953-54. The members were instructed to review the system by which the universities' extra-mural departments, the Workers' Educational Association and the other responsible bodies provide local facilities for adult education, with special reference to the conditions under which the facilities are organised and aided from public funds. The report recommends that no alterations shall be made in the organisation of adult education, but advises certain changes in the financial arrangements, including a more flexible system of grant aid, based on the quality and standards of work being done by the responsible body. This important document on adult education is recommended for wide distribution overseas in that it provides a most up-to-date survey of adult education.

705. SPARE TIME AT SEA. Ronald Hope. 1954. Published under the auspices of the Seafarers' Education Service by the Maritime Press Ltd., Wokingham, Berkshire. 12s. 6d. 176 pages. (374.2)

The Seafarers' Education Service, founded by Dr. Albert Mansbridge in 1919, provides library service to ships of the Merchant Navy, and general educational facilities for all British seafarers. Dr. Hope, who is Director of the Service and of the department of the Service known as the College of the Sea, devotes chapters to the use of leisure, keeping fit, deck and indoor games, reading and writing, radio and news, ship adoption, outdoor and indoor hobbies. The final chapter describes the activities of the College of the Sea. The appendices contain lists of books of professional interest to seafarers of books on hobbies and other spare-time interests, and of useful addresses.

CURRICULUM

706. THE UNIVERSITY TEACHING OF SOCIAL SCIENCES: INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS. C.A.W. Manning. 1954. Teaching in the Social Sciences Series. UNESCO. Obtainable from H.M. Stationery Office 4s. 100 pages. (375.341)

This report on the opportunities for the study of international relations offered by universities and other institutions of higher education is based on the replies to a comprehensive questionnaire furnished by Egypt, France, India, Mexico, Sweden, the United Kingdom, the United States of America and Yugoslavia. Among various aspects of the subject, those of staffing difficulties, and of the training, recruitment and conditions of service of teaching staff are considered. The appendix contains examples of some representative types of syllabus.

CURRICULUM (Contd.)

707. THE PLACE OF BOTANY IN THE LIFE OF A UNIVERSITY. C.D. Darlington. 1954. Oxford University Press. 2s. 6d. 23 pages. (Paper bound). (375.58)

In this important Inaugural Lecture delivered before the University of Oxford in November 1953, the Sherardian Professor of Botany explains and justifies the existence of the Chair of Botany in his university. He traces the origins and uses of this subject, considers the conflicts of ideas from the 17th century onward, and discusses the part Botany is coming to play in training for medicine and medical research.

708. ENGLISH SLIPWARE. How to Make It. Dorothy Kemp. 1954. Faber. 12s. 6d. 114 pages. (375.74559)

The author, who is a teacher in a girls' grammar school, devotes the first chapter of her book to the "argument for making slipware in secondary schools". She recommends that the course should be confined to pupils aged sixteen to eighteen years, the object of it being to teach the students to acquire the skill of making a pot, to develop their artistic appreciation and critical faculties, and to broaden their minds. Other chapters deal with the equipment of the school craftroom, and decribe the various methods of making and decorating the pots. Well illustrated with photographs and diagrams, and clearly written, the book should be useful to teachers of this craft.

709. TERRACOTTA MODELLING FOR SCHOOLS. Margaret P. Hall. 1954. Alec Tiranti. 6s. 48 pages. (375.74559)

This practical little primer gives basic information on clay modelling and firing for those teaching the craft mainly to children of secondary school standard. It is illustrated with diagrams and photographs.

710. THE YOUNG PIANIST. A New Approach for Teachers and Students. Joan Last. 1954. Oxford University Press. 12s. 6d. 155 pages. (375.786)

Intended as a guide for those who teach music to children between the ages of six to eleven, this excellent book contains many helpful and practical suggestions both for the inexperienced and for the experienced teacher. The author's aim is to "make the young pianist into an artist in miniature", and Part III of the book "From Student to Artist" embodies the main theme, with Part I (The Beginner) and Part II (From Beginner to Student) as essential steps towards its fulfilment.

EDUCATION OF WOMEN

711. POLITICS ON THE BLACKBOARD. An Autobiographical Essay. Kathleen Gibberd. 1954. Faber. 9s. 6d. 158 pages. (376.63)

Well-known as a writer of textbooks on civics for school use, Miss Gibberd has now produced an excellent treatise for the guidance of teachers of this subject. Written in autobiographical form, the book gives an account of her experiences in various types of girls'schools, and the conclusions, which she draws from these experiences, of how to teach and how not to teach civics. In addition Miss Gibberd has some very enlightening and sensible remarks to make on the education of girls generally.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

712. THE TEACHING OF RELIGION IN CATHOLIC SCHOOLS. Edited by J.J. Branigan for the Catholic Teachers' Federation. 1954. Macmillan. 8s. 6d. 322 pages. (377.82)

In 1948 the Catholic Teachers' Federation appointed a sub-committee to draw up a memorandum dealing with modern methods of teaching religion in Roman Catholic schools, and this comprehensive handbook of some three hundred pages is the result. All aspects of the subject are considered - catechism, syllabus, method in general and in all types of schools, from nursery and

infant to the sixth form stage of the grammar school. A chapter is devoted to modern developments in the catechism overseas, and the appendices consist of papers on music in religious education, the Catholic attitude to sex instruction, the impact of religion on the rest of the curriculum, and religion in youth movements. There is an eighteen page bibliography. Catholic teachers should find the book a most useful guide.

UNIVERSITIES AND COLLEGES

713. RETURNS FROM UNIVERSITIES AND UNIVERSITY COLLEGES IN RECEIPT OF TREASURY GRANT. Academic Year 1952 - 1953. Cmd. 9130. University Grants Committee. 1954. H.M. Stationery Office. 2s. 6d. 44 pages. (378.3)

These statistics, supplied by universities and colleges which receive grants from public funds, are presented annually by the University Grants Committee to the Treasury. They provide statistical information about the students, an analysis of the academic staff, various aspects of university finance, and library expenditure.

714. THE UNIVERSITY OF LEEDS: The First Half-Century. A.N. Shimmin. 1954. Published for the University of Leeds at the University Press, Cambridge. 21s. 230 pages. (378.42)

This interesting account of the first fifty years of Leeds University traces the historical and geographical background of the University, describes its coming-of-age (during which period Sir Michael Sadler was Vice-Chancellor), and its years of expansion from 1925 - 53. All aspects of university life and work are covered. Well written, beautifully produced, illustrated with photographs and with drawings by Maurice de Sausmarez (Head of the Department of Fine Arts), this volume is outstanding among those of its kind.

ILLITERACY

715. COMPULSORY EDUCATION IN SOUTH ASIA AND THE PACIFIC. 1954. Studies in Compulsory Education XIII. UNESCO. Obtainable from H.M. Stationery Office. 6s. 157 pages. (379.99)

This booklet is the outcome of the Regional Conference on Compulsory Education held in Bombay in December 1952. The first chapter considers the question of compulsory education in general, and discusses the principal problems requiring study and action. A short factual survey of compulsory education in the South Asian and Pacific region follows. The report of the deliberations at the Bombay conference are then given, and Appendix A contains recommendations formulated as a result of these discussions. The appendices also include a working paper on international assistance with free and compulsory education, and a reading list.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE

716. SPELLING. G.H. Vallins. With a Chapter on American Spelling by Professor John W. Clark. 1954. André Deutsch. 12s. 6d. 198 pages. (421)

This book, which has been written primarily for British readers, gives a very good account of the development of English spelling and of recent attempts at spelling reform. Some of the chapters, however, especially those on "Spelling and the Alphabet" and "Spelling and Word Building", will be very useful for students overseas.

717. ONE WORD AND ANOTHER. A Book of Synonyms with Explanations and Examples. V.H. Collins. 1954. Longmans, Green. 7s. 6d. 164 pages. (424)

This book is a sequel to "The Choice of Words" by the same author. The words selected are grouped alphabetically, and advice is given on their correct use. It is a useful reference book.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE (Contd.)

718. A COMPREHENSIVE ENGLISH COURSE. S.H. Burton. 1954. Longmans, Green. 5s. 9d. 228 pages. (428.2)

The author is English master at Blundells Schools, and the book is designed for pupils taking the General Certificate of Education. It contains some good chapters on Précis, Comprehension and Appreciation, and some of the exercises could be used with foreign students of English at the Intermediate or Advanced level.

719. ENGLISH COMPREHENSION AND COMPOSITION. T.H. Dalzell. 1954. Warne. 2s. 6d. 92 pages. (428.2)

This book contains three sections, the first of which provides passages of prose and verse for comprehension practice. The prose passages are more numerous than those in verse, and range from the Bible to modern writers, though the bulk of them are from nineteenth century works. Their content is reasonably accessible to foreign students, but the titles of the works from which they are taken ought to have been given. The comprehension questions are of elementary standard. The last two sections — exercises on language, including punctuation, and composition exercises — are practical and useful.

720. A FOUNDATION COURSE IN ENGLISH. Book I. (Books 2 - 5 in preparation).
A.R. Moon and G.H. McKay. 1954. Longmans, Green. 5s. 6d. 160 pages. (428.2)

This, the latest of many courses produced by these two authors, though designed for English schools, should be useful to teachers of English to foreign students, if they can select from it the sections of direct service to them. The first three chapters can be ignored. They deal with structural elements of the sentence with which foreign students should already be familiar. All the other chapters, however, contain well chosen passages, mainly of prose, which illustrate some features of the English language, together with exercises on comprehension, vocabulary and syntax.

ENGLISH FOR FOREIGN STUDENTS

721. LIVING ENGLISH SPEECH. Stress and Intonation Practice for the Foreign Student. W. Stannard Allen. 1954. Longmans, Green. 5s. 6d. 196 pages. (428.24)

This book deals with stress and intonation, and can be recommended for overseas students who are unable to study the advanced textbooks already available. The author does not use phonetic transcription. For stress patterns he employs large and small squares, and occasionally music notation. For intonation he has devised an original system of simple tone indicators combined with different kinds of type (Roman, Italics, Bold and Capitals). This system is easy to understand, and the hundred and fifty-three carefully graded exercises cover every type of tone pattern likely to be needed by the foreign learner. (A review of this book will be found in "English Language Teaching" Volume IX No. 1, pages 35 - 36).

722. OXFORD PROGRESSIVE ENGLISH FOR ADULT LEARNERS. A.S. Hornby. Oxford University Press. Book I. 1954. 5s. 196 pages. Teacher's Handbook to Book I. 1954. 3s. 6d. 99 pages. (428.24)

This is the first book of an important new course for foreign adult learners of English, written by A.S. Hornby, formerly Linguistic Adviser to the British Council. The course is based on an oral approach, and vocabulary and structures are carefully graded. The teacher's book is an essential part of the course, and the first ten lessons are based on purely oral work. Books II and III are due to be published in 1955. (A review of Book I will be found in "English Language Teaching", Vol. IX No. 1).

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ENGLISH READERS

723. A FIRST BOOK OF MODERN PROSE. Compiled by Margaret Flower. 1953. Cassell. 7s. 6d. 259 pages. (428.6)

This anthology contains prose extracts written during the last sixty years. Such writers as Kipling, Saki, H.G. Wells, P.G. Wodehouse, H.E. Bates and Conan Doyle are represented, and short biographical notes about each author are given at the end. The extracts, which have been chosen for their interest for young readers, provide useful reading matter for students with some command of the English language.

724. MODERN PORTRAIT ESSAYS. Selected and Edited with an Introduction and Notes. M. Alderton Pink. 1954. The Scholar's Library. Macmillan. 5s. 252 pages. (428.6)

This anthology of portrait essays by twentieth century writers includes character sketches by Sir Harold Nicolson, Robert Lynd, Neville Cardus, Bernard Darwin, Ivor Brown and H.E. Bates. The examples chosen vary considerably in treatment, ranging from portraits of well-known people such as Dr. Johnson, George Stephenson, Elizabeth Fry, Sir Ralph Richardson and T.E. Lawrence to those of imaginary characters or types. The selection could be used with students who have reached a fairly advanced standard in the English language.

725. NEWSPAPERS. Henry Compton. 1954. How Things are Made Series. Information Book. Educational Supply Association. 5s. 6d. 108 pages. (428.6)

This latest addition to the Information Books tells in simple English the story of the production of a provincial newspaper. It gives a good deal of technical detail presented clearly and factually, and is well illustrated. Durably bound in limp cloth, this example of a useful series can be recommended as reading material for foreign students who have some knowledge of the English language.

BIBLIOGRAPHIES

509. BOOKS FOR BACKWARD READERS. Revised edition October, 1953. Coventry City Libraries, Libraries and Museum Department, Cow Lane, Coventry. ls 6d. 15 pages. (Paper bound). (016.4286)

This revised edition contains further titles of books suitable for reading by children of normal intelligence who cannot read very well, and brings the number of books listed up to 84. See also List 19, Note 395 (iv).

LIBRARIES, SCHOOL

510. SUGGESTIONS FOR PRIMARY SCHOOL LIBRARIES. The Report of a Conference held at Gordon House on November 15th 1952, reprinted, with a Post-script and Book List, from the School Librarian, March 1953. The School Library Association, Gordon House, 29, Gordon Square, London, W.C. 1. 10d. 23 pages. (027.8222)

This report of an informal conference arranged by the School Library Association covers such topics as the special characteristics of the junior school, central and classroom libraries, library periods, the organization and administration of primary school libraries, and co-operation with the public library.

511. THE READER AND HIS NEEDS. Reader Research. The Young Reader. Being papers read at the Annual Week-End Conference of the London and Home Counties Branch of the Library Association held at Eastbourne, 16th - 18th October, 1953. The Library Association (London and Home Counties Branch), Central Library, Eastbourne. 3s. 6d. 47 pages. (Paper bound). (028.5)

Two out of the four papers in this booklet deal with the following subjects of interest to educationists:- "School Broadcasts in English and Their Relation to Reading" by Rosemary Beresford, Assistant Senior Education Officer, The School Broadcasting Council for the United Kingdom, and "A Psychologist's View of Child Reading" by Gertrude Keir, Teacher in Psychology, University College, London. A useful bibliography is given at the end of the second paper.

CHILD STUDY

512. THE FREE CHILD. A.S. Neill. 1953. Herbert Jenkins. 9s. 6d. 179 pages. (136.7)

This is the sixteenth book written by the Headmaster of Summerhill, the progressive school in Suffolk, founded some thirty years ago, and known as "That Dreadful School", a description used as a title for one of the author's earlier books. In his seventieth year A.S. Neill reviews his life work in the sphere of education, speaks frankly of his failures and successes, and reiterates his belief in freedom for children. An interesting feature of the book is the chapter reproducing the official Report of the Ministry of Education after an inspection in June 1949.

513. HOW TO HELP YOUR CHILD AT SCHOOL. Mary and Lawrence K. Frank. 1953. Odhams. 12s. 6d. 320 pages. (136.7)

This comprehensive handbook on child education, written by two American teachers who are themselves the parents of six children, contains a final chapter entitled "In Britain To-day", by J.H. Newsom, County Education Officer for Hertfordshire, and author of THE CHILD AT SCHOOL (see List 8, Note 128).

514. PARENTS AND CHILDREN. A First Book on the Psychology of Child Development and Training. C.W. Valentine. 1953. Methuen. 10s. 6d. 212 pages. (136.7)

Professor Valentine's latest book, which is addressed primarily to parents, deals with the fundamental points of psychology which have direct bearing on the training of the child, from early babyhood up to adolescence. It includes chapters on general intelligence and intelligence tests, special school problems, and discipline in the home. Based on the experiences of one of our leading child psychologists, the book is a useful guide for teachers and child welfare workers, as well as for parents.

515. SOCIAL IMPLICATIONS OF THE 1947 SCOTTISH MENTAL SURVEY. Scottish Council for Research in Education. 1953. University of London Press. 10s. 6d. 356 pages. (136.7)

In 1949 the Scottish Council for Research in Education published the TREND OF SCOTTISH INTELLIGENCE which gave an account of the 1947 survey of the intelligence of eleven-year-old Scottish children, and compared the data with those of the previous survey fifteen years earlier. The present volume is an analysis of the inter-relationship of the social background of these children with their intelligence and their physique. One of the conclusions drawn is that the central influence in the children's social and family environment appears to be the occupation of the father. The book should be of interest to sociologists and educationists specializing in mental testing.

516. THE DEPRIVED AND THE PRIVILEGED. Personality Development in English Society. B.M. Spinley. 1953. Routledge and Kegan Paul. 18s. 208 pages. (136.7327)

Dr. Spinley (a New Zealander at present working as an educational psychologist on the staff of the Sheffield Child Guidance Clinic) describes a psychological investigation into the development of personality in contrasting English social groups (i.e. people of a depressed urban area, and people who have attended English public schools). Information as to the different ways of life, habits, reactions etc. was gained from living in the slum area, from interviews, from life histories, and from the Rorschach psycho-diagnostic test (the test which was chosen as the means of gathering personality data).

517. ADVANCES IN UNDERSTANDING THE CHILD. The Home and School Committee of the English New Education Fellowship. 10th edition, 1953. English New Education Fellowship, 1, Park Crescent, London, W. 1. 2s. 6d. 75 pages. (Paper bound). (136.735)

First published in 1935, this book (originally compiled as a basis for a year's study for parents, teachers, nurses and others interested in bringing up children) consists of articles giving useful advice on fostering such qualities as confidence, helpfulness, dependability, thoroughness, and on dealing with such handicaps as fear, cruelty, stubbornness and jealousy.

518. HOME AND SCHOOL EDUCATION. The Training and Education of Children over Nine. Charlotte M. Mason. The 'Home Education' Series Volume III. 6th edition, 1953. Parents' National Educational Union Office, 171, Victoria Street, London, S.W. 1. 7s. 6d. 280 pages. (136.735)

This volume offers suggestions for the curriculum of boys and girls between the ages of nine and twelve years. It was first published, under the auspices of the Parent's National Educational Union, in 1904, and is based on the educational theories held by the P.N.E.U.

519. HOME EDUCATION. The Education and Training of Children Under Nine. Charlotte M. Mason. The 'Home Education' Series Volume I. 16th edition, 1947. Parents' National Educational Union Office, 171, Victoria Street, London, S.W. 1. 7s. 6d. 389 pages. (136.735)

First published in 1886, these lectures on the education and training of children under nine, based on the educational theories held by the Parents' National Educational Union, were reprinted in 1947. They deal with many branches of child education including the value of out-of-door life, of forming the right habits (physical, mental and moral), the curriculum and, finally, the spiritual development of children.

520. ADVANCES IN UNDERSTANDING THE ADOLESCENT. The Home and School Committee of the English New Education Fellowship. 7th edition, 1953. English New Education Fellowship, 1, Park Crescent, London, W. 1. 2s. 6d. 107 pages. (136.7354)

This book, which was first published in 1938, consists of articles originally published in HOME AND SCHOOL, the official organ of the Home and School Council of Great Britain. Among the aspects of the subjects dealt with are the following:— the stage just before adolescence, health and habits, the self-consciousness of adolescence, the adolescent's right to independence, recreation, careers, on being a parent.

521. THE SPIRITUAL DEVELOPMENT OF THE CHILD. Agatha H. Bowley and Michael Townroe. 1953. E. & S. Livingstone. 6s. 80 pages. (136.742)

The authors of this book are a leading child psychologist and a parish priest (himself a parent and a teacher), who share the conviction that in all child care it is essential that the spiritual aspect of development is taken into account, as well as the mental and physical. Written from the Christian standpoint, the book covers all periods of a child's life from babyhood to adolescence, and includes a chapter on the special needs of the deprived and handicapped child. The foreword is by Dr. Alan Moncrieff, Nuffield Professor of Child Health.

CHILD WELFARE

522. CHILD MIGRATION TO AUSTRALIA. John Moss. Home Office. 1953. H.M. Stationery Office. 2s. 50 pages. (362.7)

This report is an independent record, by a member of the Curtis Care of Children Committee, of his enquiries into conditions in Homes in Australia where children emigrating from Great Britain are received. It includes a brief survey of the educational facilities available for the migrants.

JUVENILE DELINQUENCY

523. THE JUVENILE OFFENDER. G.L. Reakes. 1953. Christopher Johnson. 10s. 6d. 182 pages. (364.36)

The author, who is a Justice of the Peace and Chairman of the Wallasey Juvenile Court, gives much useful information for the general reader about the juvenile court, probation, the remand home, Borstal training, approved schools, and other aspects of juvenile delinquency. The book is eminently readable, but some of Mr. Reakes's opinions (e.g. those on birching) are controversial. The foreword is by the Hon. Mr. Justice Lynskey.

YOUTH WORK

524. VOLUNTARY YOUTH LEADERS. P.H.K. Kuenstler. University of Bristol, Institute of Education. Publication No. 5. 1953. University of London Press. 2s. 6d. 60 pages. (369.4)

This report surveys the contribution made by adults who voluntarily and in their spare time undertake the leadership of youth units, and stresses the importance of this form of voluntary service. Part I gives the general background, Parts II and III the result of the 1951 survey carried out among youth leaders. Part IV considers the future.

525. MAKING MEN. The History of Boys' Clubs and Related Movements in Great Britain. W. McG. Eagar. 1953. University of London Press. 20s. 437 pages. (369.42)

This book, by one of the founders of the National Association of Boys' Clubs who is also its Vice-President, gives a comprehensive account of the origin, development and nature of the clubs and other organisations for boys in Great Britain. The history of club work through the nineteenth century is described in detail, and Mr. Eagar includes accounts of the founding and growth of the Boys' Brigades and the Boy Scouts. The book, which is likely to be regarded as a standard work on the origins of club work and youth service, is recommended for wide distribution.

EDUCATIONAL SOCIOLOGY

526. EDUCATION AND SOCIETY. An Introduction to the Sociology of Education.
A.K.C. Ottaway. 1953. Routledge and Kegan Paul. 18s. 182 pages.
(370.193)

This comprehensive book on the function of education in its social setting is the first general introduction to the subject to be written from the English point of view. The author (who is Lecturer in Education at the University of Leeds), in considering the relations between the educational system and society in Great Britain, takes into account recent discoveries in anthropology and social psychology, as well as in general sociology. Chapters are devoted to the social forces determining education in England from the mid-nineteenth century onwards. Mr. Ottaway has written a valuable textbook for teachers, educationists and sociologists. It is recommended for distribution to our overseas libraries.

UNESCO

527. NEW HORIZONS AT TZENTZENHUARO. One year of work at a Fundamental Education Centre for Latin America. 1953. UNESCO. Obtainable from H.M. Stationery Office. 2s. 33 pages. (370.621)

This book gives an account of the first year's work at the Patzcuaro centre in Mexico, a key feature of UNESCO'S fundamental education programme as it has been applied in Latin America.

528. REPORT TO THE UNITED NATIONS 1952 - 1953. UNESCO. Obtainable from H.M. Stationery Office. 16s. 6d. 236 pages. (370.621)

This, the fifth annual report submitted by UNESCO, includes critical surveys of three major features of UNESCO's work, namely, the encouragement of scientific research, the extension of free and compulsory primary education, and education for living in a world community.

529. THE USE OF VERNACULAR LANGUAGES IN EDUCATION. Monographs on Fundamental Education VIII. 1953. UNESCO. Obtainable from H.M. Stationery Office. 6s. 154 pages. (370.621)

The main object of this booklet is to provide a report of the meetings (held in Paris in 1951) of specialists to consider the use of vernacular languages in education. The report also contains an introductory survey for the layman on the nature of language and its use in education, and a brief review of the world situation. At the requests of the specialists themselves, some case studies are added to illustrate certain aspects of their report.

TEACHER TRAINING

530. PRIMARY TEACHER TRAINING. Second Part. XVIth International Conference on Public Education convened by UNESCO and the International Bureau of Education. I.B.E. Publication No. 149. 1953. UNESCO. Obtainable from H.M. Stationery Office. 5s. 69 pages. (370.7)

The first part of this volume, published in 1950, contained reports on primary teacher training from fifty-one countries. The second part contains a further sixteen reports. The two volumes are intended for use as a basis of discussion at the XVIth International Conference on Public Education, Geneva 1953.

EDUCATION, GREAT BRITAIN

531. TWO HUNDRED AND FIFTY YEARS OF SCOTTISH EDUCATION 1696 - 1946. H.M. Knox. 1953. Oliver and Boyd. 15s. 253 pages. (370.941)

Professor Knox divides the span of two hundred and fifty years under review into five periods - the eighteenth century, the first half of the nineteenth century, the middle of the century, the latter part of the century, and the twentieth century. As far as is applicable, developments in the various branches of education (primary, secondary, university, teacher training etc.) are dealt with in each section. Although designed primarily as a textbook for use in Universities and training colleges, the book should appeal to all who are interested in Scottish affairs and in the history of education in Great Britain. It is recommended for wide distribution.

532. AGE AND YOUTH. Memories of Three Universities and Father of the Man. Sir Ernest Barker. 1953. Oxford University Press. 21s. 347 pages. (370.942)

This book is in two parts in the order of the title. The first part, written when Sir Ernest Barker was about seventy-seven, records his memories of three Universities (Oxford, Cambridge and King's College, London), and the many world-famous personalities who have been his colleagues and pupils. He makes some interesting comparisons between Oxford and Cambridge, devotes a chapter to University affairs and administration, and reviews briefly his experiences with other universities. The second part, "Father of the Man" was written some years ago, and was previously published by

the National Council of Social Service. In it he describes his early life as a poor boy who, with no assets but ability, character and determination, won his way to Manchester Grammar School and Balliol, and then on to his present eminence in the world of learning. His kindly and courageous personality fills the book, and the account of his triumph over adverse circumstances makes a most inspiring story.

533. BETTER SCHOOLS NOW. Peggy Jay. 1953. Turnstile Press. 7s. 6d. 92 pages. (370.942)

The author of this book was for many years a member of the London County Council Education Committee, and is a mother of four children (her husband is a Member of Parliament). In Part I Mrs. Jay describes fairly and frankly the British educational system as it exists to-day; in Part II she offers suggestions for remedying overcrowded classes, the dearth of teachers and the over-anxiety about the eleven-plus entrance examination. Although Mrs. Jay writes critically of many aspects of education, her book is in most respects both sensible and constructive.

534. COUNTY AND VOLUNTARY SCHOOLS. W.P. Alexander and F. Barraclough. Second edition, 1953. Councils and Education Press. 10s. 6d. 130 pages. (370.942)

The second edition of this book includes amendments arising out of the Education (Miscellaneous Provosions) Act, 1953, and incorporates the supplement to the first edition, which was published separately. Where necessary, the text and notes have also been amended. It is a useful guide for administrators, managers, governors and teachers, and is recommended for distribution to any countries who have not had the original edition.

535. DR. ARNOLD OF RUGBY. Norman Wymer. 1953. Robert Hale. 21s. 208 pages. (370.942)

The author gives an account of the life and work of the famous headmaster who was chiefly responsible for the reform of public-school education which substituted for the brutalities of flogging and bullying the prefectorial system and the ideal of the Christian gentleman and sportsman. Arnold was a staunch advocate of the Classics in education and, during his headmastership of Rugby (1828-1842), he introduced the now familiar scheme whereby form-masters are made responsible for the studies of groups of boys. This is the first book on Arnold since Dean Stanley's Life of 1844, but there is still room for a definitive biography.

536. TWELFTH REPORT FROM THE SELECT COMMITTEE ON ESTIMATES. Session 1952-53. Technical Education. 1953. H.C.P. 273. H.M. Stationery Office. 7s. 6d. 173 pages. (370.942)

This report considers such matter as unsatisfactory buildings, new buildings, day-time releases, degrees and diplomas, out-county fees, and makes recommendations concerning these. Minutes of evidence taken from various bodies are given, and memoranda submitted by some of them are appended.

EDUCATION, OTHER COUNTRIES

537. AFRICANS AND THEIR SCHOOLS. Margret Read. British Commonwealth Affairs. No. 8. 1953. Longmans Green. 1s. 6d. 23 pages. (Paper bound). (370.96)

In this pamphlet the Head of the Department of Education in Tropical Areas of the Institute of Education gives a broad survey of the educational task confronting Africans and Europeans in British Tropical Africa. In Part I Professor Read considers the "Foundations of Modern Education in Africa" and in Part II "The Modern Task in Education" in Africa, The booklet provides useful background material for a discussion of the problem.

TEACHERS' SALARIES, PENSIONS, ETC.

538. FRIMARY TEACHERS' SALARIES. XVIth International Conference on Public Education Convened by UNESCO and the International Bureau of Education. I.B.E. Publication No. 147. 1953. UNESCO. Obtainable from H.M.Stationery Office. 11s. 6d. 325 pages. (371.16)

This publication contains a survey giving an overall picture of public primary teachers' legal status, salary scales, holidays, pensions etc., followed by the answers from 56 countries to a question-naire on the subject sent out by the International Bureau of Education.

MENTAL TESTS

539. PREPARATION FOR THE WORKING OF INTELLIGENCE TESTS. Martin Waverley, 1953. Harrap. 5s. 43 pages. (371.212)

The aim of this book is to set out, as fairly as possible, some of the best-known and most widely used types of group intelligence tests, and the different ways in which they are presented, so that children may become accustomed to doing them before they sit, at the age of eleven plus, for the examination for transfer to a secondary school. Illustrative examples and practice exercises are provided to help teachers and others to make up further exercises. Answers are given at the end of the book.

540. WHICH WAY? A Guide to Grammar School Entry for Parents and Teachers. Together with the Golden Mean Revision Exercises (and Key). C. Midgley. 1953. A. Wheaton (Exeter). 6s. 203 pages. The Golden Mean Revision Exercises only, 2s. With Key, 3s. (371.212)

This practical little book explains simply and informally the various types of secondary education available to children at the age of eleven, and gives their parents sensible guidance about the requirements for grammar school entry. The latter part of the book consists of revision exercises in Arithmetic, English and Intelligence for the Grammar School Selection Examination, (with Key). These are also published separately.

TEACHING

541. THE TEACHER AND HIS PUPILS. Hubert J. Byrne. 1953. Oxford University Press. 4s. 6d. 185 pages. (371.3)

The author, who is on the staff of Bussere Training College, Anglo-Egyptian Sudan, has written this book for the guidance of primary school teachers in African Schools. Chapters are devoted to the aims of the teacher, the teacher in the classroom, the preparation of lessons, the teacher and child relationship, general teaching methods, setting and marking examination papers, the syllabus and the timetable, health, and various other aspects of education. Illustrated by numerous line drawings, the book, which is clearly and sensibly written, should be useful to all teachers in countries with a similar background.

VOCATIONAL

542. CAREERS FOR BOYS. A Guide to the Choice of a Profession. J.G. Watterson. 1953. Ward, Lock. 12s. 6d. 256 pages. (371.425)

This book gives information about some eighty careers for boys, mainly professional, arranged in alphabetical order. Attractively produced, with several full-page photographs, it should be useful in the careers section of a library.

543. EDUCATION AND TRAINING IN THE FIELD OF MANAGEMENT. 1953. British Institute of Management, Management House, 8, Hill Street, London, W. 1. 7s. 6d. 200 pages. (Paper bound). (371.426)

This survey, which describes the courses in education and training for management available in the United Kingdom, is divided into three parts:—
(1) Courses at Universities and Associated Colleges of Technology,
(2) Courses at Technical and Commercial Colleges and Colleges of Further Education, and (3) Management Subjects in the Examinations of Professional and Educational Bodies. Where possible, full syllabuses have been printed.

SCHOOL BUILDINGS, EQUIPMENT, ETC.

544. ADVENTURE PLAYGROUNDS. Lady Allen of Hurtwood. 1953. The National Playing Fields Association, 71, Eccleston Square, London, S.W. 1. 2s. 16 pages. (Paper bound). (371.61)

This pamphlet was published after a meeting (held under the auspices of the National Playing Fields Association) of a number of people interested in the idea of adventure playgrounds. These playgrounds are intended for children aged six to eighteen who want to be able to carry out tough jobs of real work in an atmosphere of freedom and enterprise. Little orthodox equipment is needed, although an essential feature is a lean-to shed for carpentry, stores, shelter, or for any other purpose the children may decide. The booklet, which reproduces descriptions of two experiments, one in Copenhagen and one in Minneapolis, is recommended for the consideration of all who are concerned with providing recreation for children between the ages of, say, nine to sixteen.

545. SCHOOL DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION. J.A. Godfrey and R. Castle Cleary. 1953. Architectural Press. 36s. 373 pages. (371.62)

This up-to-date, practical textbook on all aspects of school building in Britain provides a comprehensive review of contemporary school design. The first section gives a brief historical study of the background against which the school building programme is set. The second section deals with the planning of sites, playgrounds and playing fields, and with nursery, primary and secondary school buildings. The functional requirements (e.g. lighting, ventilation, heating and hot water supply, sound insulation and acoustics, water supply and drainage, fire precautions) are considered in the third section and, finally, chapters are devoted to the different methods of construction used in building schools, and to their equipment. Wherever appropriate, reference is made to the Building Regulations (1951) and to the Building Bulletins of the Ministry of Education. The book, which is well produced and illustrated with numerous plans and photographs, should be invaluable for answering enquiries about the building of schools in Britain, and is recommended for wide distribution.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

546. PHYSICAL TRAINING FOR WEST AFRICA. With special reference to Nigeria. N.C. Kay. 1953. Macmillan. 7s. 163 pages. (371.7)

This handbook by the Education Officer-in-Charge, Government Teacher Training Centre, Uyo, is intended for teachers and intending teachers of physical training in schools in West Africa, particularly in Nigeria. Study of the Board of Education Syllabus is recommended, and eighteen tables worked out on its lines, and designed for use with boys over the age of thirteen years in senior primary and secondary schools, are included. The book should be useful in countries with a similar background.

547. PHYSICAL EDUCATION FOR INFANTS. Ivy Munden. 1953. University of London Press. 6s. 6d. 90 pages. (371.7322)

The Organiser of Physical Education to the Walsall Education Committee first compares and contrasts the old and new aims of physical education for infants. She then describes the variety of apparatus essential to the carrying out of modern schemes and the uses to which this can be put. Separate chapters are devoted to the physical education of the nursery-school child, and of the five, six, and seven year-olds. A final chapter deals with games training for infants. The book, which steers a middle course between free play and formal physical education, contains many practical suggestions for teachers, particularly for those who would like advice on how to develop their work on modern lines. It is well illustrated.

548. PHYSICAL EDUCATION IN THE PRIMARY SCHOOL. Part II. Planning the Programme. Ministry of Education and Central Office of Information. 1953. H.M. Stationery Office. 6s. 72 pages. (371.7322)

This book, which is concerned with the planning of physical education in primary schools, should be read in conjunction with MOVING AND GROWING, noted in List 17, No. 328 (v). These two publications replace the SYLLABUS OF PHYSICAL TRAINING FOR SCHOOLS, issued by the Board of Education in 1933. The second volume contains chapters on the school hall and playing field, physical activity, games, dance, swimming. It is well illustrated.

HANDICAPPED PUPILS

549. THE DEAF AND THEIR PROBLEMS. A Study in Special Education. Kenneth W. Hodgson. 1953. Watts. 21s. 364 pages. (371.912)

This general study of the problems of deafness begins with a scientific account of the ear and of the mechanism of hearing. The second part gives an historical account, from the sixteenth century onwards, of the treatment of the deaf, of the use of signs as a means of communicating with them, and of the evolution of the alternative methods of education by signs, and by speech and lip reading. The last part of the book deals with the problems of the deaf in the twentieth century. The book should be most useful to all who have to deal with deaf children and adults.

550. THE EDUCATION OF DEAF CHILDREN. Booklet Number 486. 1953. Produced in co-operation with the National College of Teachers of the Deaf, and published by the National Institute for the Deaf, 105, Gower Street, London, W.C. 1. 1s. 3d. 36 pages. (371.912)

This pamphlet is intended for the information of parents of deaf children and for student teachers of the deaf. In addition to a full list of schools for the deaf and partially deaf in the British Isles, it includes a number of informative articles by some of the leading British authorities on such aspects of this subject as the following:— A Short History of the Education of the Deaf in Great Britain, Present Day Oral Methods of Teaching in Schools for the Deaf, Training and Qualifications of Teachers of the Deaf, On Leaving School, and the Education of Deaf Children with Additional Handicaps.

551. THE CAUSES AND TREATMENT OF BACKWARDNESS. Sir Cyril Burt. Second edition, revised and enlarged 1953. University of London Press. 8s. 6d. 128 pages. (371.92)

This book was first published in 1952 (see List 19, Note 374), and has now been revised and enlarged, and an introductory chapter added.

552. EDUCATING THE SUB-NORMAL CHILD. Aspects of the Work of a Junior School for Educationally Sub-normal Children. Frances Lloyd. 1953. Contributions to Modern Education Series. Methuen. 11s. 6d. 148 pages. (371.92)

The author, who is Headmistress of a school for educationally sub-normal children, discusses the educability of the mentally handicapped, the aims of the special school and the way in which it can best achieve these aims, the social training of such children with special reference to their cultural background and their parents' attitudes and, finally, how mentally handicapped children who are emotionally disturbed can be helped through creative work to adjust themselves to life. A chapter is included on delinquency. Miss Lloyd concentrates mainly on the junior school, where the foundations of the work are laid, and emphasises her belief in the value of special school treatment in helping handicapped children to develop to their utmost. The book is a valuable and much needed contribution to the subject.

553. THE MENTALLY HANDICAPPED IN THE COMMUNITY. 1952. National Association for Mental Health, 39, Queen Anne Street, London, W. 1. 5s. 47 pages. (Paper bound). (371.92)

A Conference on Mental Health was held at Bedford College, London, N.W. 1. 27th - 29th March, 1952. The speakers addressed the meetings on the subject of the mentally handicapped at home, at school and in employment, and these addresses, together with the discussions which followed, are here reported.

NURSERY SCHOOLS

554. MENTAL HYGIENE IN THE NURSERY SCHOOL. Report of a Joint WHO-UNESCO Expert Meeting held in Paris, 17th - 22nd September 1951. Problems in Education IX. 1953. UNESCO. Obtainable from H.M. Stationery Office. ls. 33 pages. (372.2412)

This collection of studies by a group representing UNESCO and the World Health Organisation covers such aspects of nursery education as the development and function of the nursery school, the rôle of the mother and of the nursery school teacher, and the recruitment, selection and training of nursery school teachers.

SECONDARY EDUCATION

555. PARENTS' GUIDE TO SECONDARY EDUCATION. H.A. Wrenn. 1953. Cambridge University Press. 3s. 6d. 85 pages. (Paper bound). (373)

This concise guide to the educational system of Great Britain describes the new framework of education consequent upon the Education Act 1944, the annual entrance examinations both for state and independent schools, the various types of secondary education, the school health service and careers. A final chapter discusses miscellaneous problems (e.g. parent - teacher associations, school uniform, foreign visits, exchanges and correspondence). The book should be useful for overseas enquirers needing a short guide to secondary education in Britain, and is recommended for wide distribution.

556. THE GOLDEN YEARS. Being a history of Houndsfield School, Edmonton, Middlesex, 1903-1953. George W. Sturges. 1953. Houndsfield County Secondary School, Edmonton, Middlesex. 2s. 6d. 41 pages. (373.42)

This account of a London elementary school during the first fifty years of its existence has been written by one of the staff, and printed and bound by the scholars themselves. It gives an interesting picture of an elementary school which, as the result of the Education Act, has been reorganised as a mixed secondary modern school and a mixed primary school.

ADULT EDUCATION

557. ADULT EDUCATION. Supplement. Field Survey. 1953. National Institute of Adult Education, 35, Queen Anne Street, London, W. 1. 2s. 46 pages. (Paper bound). (374)

This supplement to the quarterly review ADULT EDUCATION gives accounts of recent activities from bodies such as Local Authorities and University Departments of Adult Education. These are presented under the headings New Centres, Leadership Training, Action with Special Groups, New Ventures at Large, and Emphasis on Co-operation.

CURRICULUM

558. THE TEACHING OF PHILOSOPHY. An International Enquiry of UNESCO. 1953. UNESCO. Obtainable from H.M. Stationary Office. 9s. 6d. 230 pages. (375.1)

This report contains the conclusions emerging from the replies to the international enquiry made by UNESCO in 1951-52 into the teaching of philosophy, with special reference to the place allotted to it in the educational systems of various countries, its influence upon the moulding of the citizen, and the contribution it can make towards bringing about better understanding among men.

559. TEACHING RELIGIOUS KNOWLEDGE. A Book of Method for Teachers.
Bernard R. Youngman. 1953. University of London Press. 12s. 6d.
238 pages. (375.23)

This book gives much useful guidance, mainly of a practical nature, to teachers of religious knowledge. Part I examines the problem generally, and includes a chapter on the application of various Agreed Syllabuses to classes of children of different agegroups. Part II (the main section of the book) is a comprehensive survey of methods of teaching scripture, including the project method, brains trusts, school journeys, visual aids and classroom games. Part III gives information about the Institute of Christian Education, and the qualifications which teachers can now obtain. A bibliography is appended.

560. THE UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS. A Guide for Teachers. Towards World Understanding VIII. 1953. UNESCO. Obtainable from H.M. Stationery Office. 3s. 87 pages. (375.341)

This booklet offers suggestions for teaching about human rights in and out of the classroom, and for encouraging in children an appreciation of the spirit of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, adopted by the General Assembly of the United Nations in December 1948. The full text of the Declaration and a description of the work of the Commission which drafted it are given as background information. The appendices contain some examples of methods and programmes of teaching about human rights, and a list of materials useful to teachers.

561. TEACHING A MODERN LANGUAGE. Vernon Mallinson. 1953. Heinemann. 8s. 6d. 136 pages. (375.4)

This book, which is primarily concerned with the teaching of French as a second language, contains a useful bibliography on the teaching of modern languages generally.

562. A BACKGROUND TO PRIMARY SCHOOL MATHEMATICS. L.D. Adams. 1953. Oxford University Press. 8s. 6d. 189 pages. (375.51)

In this book Mr. Adams, lately H.M. Inspector of Schools, gives an interesting account of his experiences and opinions of the teaching of mathematics in primary schools, based on many years of observation of school children up to the age of 11. He illustrates his account by examples showing the children's work, their conversations and answers, and their methods of tackling problems. The book, which is a valuable contribution to the subject, is recommended to teachers and intending teachers of mathematics in all types of schools.

563. THE TEACHING OF HIGHER GEOMETRY IN SCHOOLS. A Report prepared for the Mathematical Association. 1953. G. Bell. 7s. 6d. 119 pages. (375.513)

This Report, prepared by a Sub-Committee and adapted by the Teaching Committee of the Mathematical Association, is addressed to teachers of mathematics with the intention of presenting them with ideas and material which will provoke discussion and invite experiments. After a general survey, the nature of school geometry is discussed, and advanced syllabuses are examined in detail. The report should interest all teachers of mathematics, particularly those whose work is mainly with the senior school.

564. THE TEACHING OF CLASSICS. Incorporated Association of Assistant Masters in Secondary Schools. 1954. Cambridge University Press. 12s. 6d. 244 pages. (375.87)

This authoritative handbook on the teaching of classics in public, secondary grammar, and preparatory schools is the sixth of the important post-war reports issued by the Association of Assistant Masters in Secondary Schools on the teaching of the main subjects in the curriculum. After an introduction decribing the purpose, principles and aims in teaching the Classics, chapters are devoted to Junior and Middle-School Latin, Greek: The Early Years, Teaching Methods, Classics in the Sixth Form, Ancient History, Life and Literature, Classics in the Secondary Modern School, Examinations, and Aids to the Teaching of Classics. The appendices contain sections on pronunciation, examination requirements for entry to universities and professions, and a short bibliography on the teaching of Classics.

565. PICTURE SOURCE BOOK FOR SOCIAL HISTORY. SEVENTEENTH CENTURY.
Molly Harrison and A.A.M. Wells. 1953. Allen and Unwin. 9s. 6d.
128 pages. (375.942)

This source book for children studying the seventeenth century follows the same lines as the one about the sixteenth century. (See List 19, Note 388). Pictures of the period and extracts from contemporary writings illustrate such subjects as the people and their clothes, school, travel, town and country, work, punishments, medicine and government.

UNIVERSITIES AND COLLEGES

566. CHOOSING UNIVERSITY STUDENTS. Planning Vol. XIX. No. 357. November 23rd, 1953. Political and Economic Planning, 16, Queen Anne's Gate, London, S.W. 1. 2s. 16 pages. (Paper bound). (378.1)

The problem of the demand by potential candidates for University places is increasing in Great Britain. This pamphlet considers the situation as it stands at present, discusses the methods of selection procedure now being used, and ways of improving these. One of the conclusions drawn is that the central Government should assume full financial responsibility (instead of, as at present, sharing it with the local authorities), and thus be solely responsible for the selection of students.

567. HEBREW UNIVERSITY GARLAND. A Silver Jubilee Symposium. Edited by Norman Bentwich. 1952. Constellation Books. 17s. 6d. 133 pages. (378.5694)

The English Friends of the Hebrew University of Jerusalem (which celebrated its Silver Jubilee in 1950) completed their first twenty-five years of activity in 1951, and to mark the occasion published this book, as a Silver Jubilee Garland. The articles, which are mainly by teachers of the University about the contribution of Israel to learning and science during the last twenty-five years, also include one by Viscount Samuel on the "Limitations of Political Science". The last part of the book contains a survey by the Editor of the work accomplished by the English Friends.

ILLITERACY

568. PROGRESS OF LITERACY IN VARIOUS COUNTRIES. A preliminary statistical study of available census data since 1900. Monographs on Fundamental Education No. VI. 1953. UNESCO. Obtainable from H.M. Stationery Office. 8s. 6d. 254 pages. (379.2)

This intensive study of the incidence of world illiteracy on a comparative international level covers 26 countries (those for which illiteracy figures are available for three or more census years since 1900).

ENGLISH LANGUAGE

569. OUR LIVING LANGUAGE. An Englishman looks at his Language. A.P. Rossiter. 1953. Longmans. 249 pages. 10s. 6d. (420.4)

The first part of this book consists of essays on the English language, six of them being transcripts of talks broadcast by the B.B.C. in 1952. The second part, which is much shorter, contains two essays on practical criticism. The book is written in a very colloquial style, and is lively and controversial. The first part is of particular interest to phoneticians.

570. 'O' LEVEL TESTS IN ENGLISH GRAMMAR AND IDIOM. John D. Stephenson. 1953. Methuen. 3s. 6d. 79 pages (425)

This book consists of a comprehensive series of exercises in English grammar and idioms for students who are preparing for the Ordinary level of the General Certificate of Education. Each chapter consists of questions on one of the various parts of speech, e.g. nouns, adjectives, verbs, conjunctions, figures of speech, prefixes and suffixes. The book should be useful in countries where the Council has teaching centres.

These reading books consist of well chosen extracts from modern books, dealing with exciting aspects of life and written in language that can easily be understood. Intended for use in secondary schools in this country, the extracts should hold the interest of adult students who have some command of the English language.

574. THE WINDOW OF PROSE. Kathleen E. Morgan. Book I (for pupils of 13 - 14). 177 pages. Book II (for pupils of 14 - 15). 186 pages. 1953. Edward Arnold. 4s. 6d. each. (428.6)

READING FOR VISION. A Companion to "THE WINDOW OF PROSE". Kathleen E. Morgan. 1953. Edward Arnold. 8s. 6d. 159 pages. (428.6)

This two-volume authology of English prose for children in their early teens compiled by the Senior Lecturer in English, Edge Hill Training College, Ormskirk, includes extracts from some modern writers (e.g. Eleanor Doorly, C. Walter Hodges, J.B. Priestley, Sir Francis Younghusband) as well as from the classics. They are grouped under the following headings:- Book I Novel and Story, Early Memories, Biography and Portrait. Book II Novel and Story, Panoramas, Travel and Exploration, Day by Day. The books provide useful material for students who have some command of the English language.

In the companion volume READING FOR VISION, Miss Morgan considers the aims and problems of teaching English Literature in schools, the choice of books for school reading, how to teach children to understand prose, and reading as an incentive to creative work. Two-thirds of the book are devoted to commentaries on the selections contained in "The Window of Prose". A bibliography of books for the use of teachers and pupils is appended.

Also in this Series: THE THEATRE WINDOW. Plays for Schools. Selected by W.T. Cunningham. Books I, II and III. Edward Arnold. 4s. 6d. each. Approximately 200 pages each. (428.6)

The plays in these collections have been chosen for boys and girls of secondary school age, and are intended either for class reading or for acting.

PUBLIC HEALTH

575. THE CIVILIAN HEALTH AND MEDICAL SERVICES. Edited by Sir Arthur Salusbury MacNalty. Volume I The Ministry of Health Services; Other Civilian Health and Medical Services. 1953. H.M. Stationery Office. 45s. 441 pages. (614.0942)

In this, the first volume on the Medical History of the Second World War, chapters are included on "Maternity and Child Welfare", and the "School Medical Service" (Ministry of Education.)

POETRY

576. THE ANATOMY OF POETRY. Marjorie Boulton. 1953. Routledge and Kegan Paul. 10s. 6d. 189 pages. (808.1)

This book, by a lecturer in a teachers' training college, provides a useful introduction to the various aspects of poetic technique, and is intended for the use of teachers and senior pupils in secondary grammar schools and teachers in training. Chapters are devoted to the importance of form, rhythm, phonetic form, intonation, the use of repetition, traditional verse forms, free verse, and the choice of words. A detailed discussion of two poems is included, and a list of books for further reading is appended.
